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

to furnish programs and services" to
public school districts and state
supported schools.

- •Often referred to as REC 5, CREC is one of 10 regional educational cooperatives in New Mexico.
- •Established in 1984 by the New Mexico Department of Education.
- •CREC provides related (ancillary) services to a total of 15 school districts and charter schools throughout NM; other statewide program supports and professional learning opportunities.
- •CREC provides fiscal and program support to many NM initiatives in partnership with the Public Education Dept, Early Childhood Education and Care Dept, Commission for the Blind and NM RECs.

- Over 3000 students served in 11 member districts
- Over 5000 NM educators participated in CREC provided PreK through 12<sup>th</sup> grade professional learning/support activities in universal Design for Learning (UDL), LETRS-Early Childhood, and other professional development events.
- 26,500 students received UDL tools, coaching and resources.
- O **Over 72 infants and preschool children** participated in Child Find Events within the 6-member school districts.
- O Medicaid in the Schools (MITS) billing and assistance was provided to 6-member, and one charter school to over **300 students** and to 6-nonmember districts for over **248 students on IEP**.
- O Provided Pre-Employment Transition Services via regional vocational transition specialists to 117 visually impaired and students with disabilities across the state.
- O Direct educational services provided by **37 CREC Related Service Providers** (including contractors) for **over 550 special education students** in 15 school districts throughout NM. **Over 300 Evaluations** (educational, assistive and psychological) were provided to students in those districts.
